Candidate Statement

Thomas Jefferson stated, "Design activity and political thought are indivisible." I support this dictum by investigating how architecture can be a vehicle for impact and change in society, a truly democratic discipline that incorporates a diverse array of voices into the production of the built environment. As architectural educators, it is our responsibility to guide our students to see their future practices as proactively engaging critical contemporary issues such as poverty, climate change, and rapid urbanization. It is also our responsibility to articulate the relevance of our discipline so that we can attract more diverse students, retain more of our graduates, and play central roles in setting priorities for our planet's future.

During the past ten years at lowa State University, I have focused on how architecture can address society's inequities by teaching and mentoring students and young professionals in engaged design methods, and fostering opportunities for engaged design research and practice. I created the Bridge Studio and the ISU Community Design Lab to provide opportunities for students to engage public interest design and create an institutional fabric supporting engaged design research. As part of ISU Extension and Outreach, I have also expanded the range of publics that architecture engages, connecting design to issues of rural and urban poverty, disaster recovery, and environmental resilience. My background in international practice has been invaluable in navigating academic structures and now, as I hopefully move into a new phase of my academic career, I seek to not only serve my students and colleagues at ISU but also my peers in the West Central Region and all of ACSA.



I believe that engagement, defined by the Carnegie Foundation as "the mutually beneficial exchange of knowledge and resources in a context of partnership and reciprocity," can be a foundation for

architecture's ability to expand agency by partnering with communities, multidisciplinary colleagues, and students to challenge conventions of top-down expertise in favor of reciprocal collaboration. To do this, architects need to see themselves as relational catalysts moving between the grassroots and "grass tops," between the local and the global, between the conceptual and the material. In many ways, we already know how to do this by exploring iterations and visualizing new futures, setting criteria and testing options. Engaged design helps keep these investigations open, creating a public world that facilitates appropriation rather than control. Many ACSA member programs engage architecture students in work with communities and public interest design is rapidly expanding the world of practice. As the voice of architectural education, ACSA has an important role to play in articulating the importance of engagement for learning as well as how engaged research and scholarship build academic and professional careers in our discipline.

Through our teaching and research, we can expand the architectural profession's relevance in addressing complex contemporary issues such as economic inequity, climate change, and rapid urbanization. This is relevant in our major cities as well as rural states like lowa where communities struggle to negotiate tensions between, for example, nineteenth century floodplain development and twenty-first century flooding of low-income neighborhoods. In the West Central Region in particular, we are surrounded by global systems such as energy and food production and distribution and we see how these systems impact ordinary lives, often prioritizing short-term financial gain over long-term social and environmental health. As a candidate for West Central Regional Director, I understand architectural teaching, research, and practice as well as the structures that shape them and believe I can help lead our region and the ACSA as a whole in framing future-oriented and inclusive structures for architectural education.
