Candidate Statement

An education in architecture represents an unparalleled intellectual preparation. Interactive, collaborative, trans-disciplinary and research based; innovative across modalities and platforms of production; profoundly engaged and increasingly entrepreneurial; our evolving pedagogical model embodies every element to which the academy increasingly aspires. In so doing, it opens new opportunities for our discipline to lead the institutions in which our programs reside.

While many ACSA member programs have crafted exemplary responses to the substantive challenges that accompany our ambitious educational model, all of our programs are immersed in addressing a list that includes diminishing institutional funding to support faculty and student work; a need to increase student and faculty diversity; the imperative to facilitate broad accessibility and affordability to our programs; the challenges of reframing the possibilities offered by online education; and in response to the breadth and rapid pace of change in the academy and the profession, the need to reassess, and perhaps recalibrate, our curricular structures.

Notwithstanding our present-day challenges and all those that surely lie ahead, the task of architecture programs remains constant: To facilitate an accessible education in the design of the built environment –one that identifies and frames complex problems in thoughtful, nuanced terms; that nurtures an agile, elastic, entrepreneurial mindset; and one that prepares our graduates to engage productively in the many available modes of practice that await them. In this context, the singular power of ACSA lies in its role as the voice of the academy in the processes that shape the future of our profession. Through its conferences, publications, competitions, and archives, it brings its diverse membership together, providing invaluable tools, resources, and opportunities for faculty and program development and for collegial exchange.



Not a stranger to ACSA, I had the honor of co-chairing the 2004 Annual Meeting, and have valued each opportunity to collaborate with faculty from ACSA member schools, authoring white papers for the last NAAB Accreditation Review Conference --on the role of social responsibility in architecture curricula, and on innovative models of education and accreditation. Since 2003, I have represented ACSA on NAAB visiting teams as both team member and chair. Those experiences have allowed me to work closely with representatives of all our collateral organizations [AIA, NCARB, and AIAS] and have introduced me to a rich array of architecture programs --private and public, large and small, new and long established, in the U.S. and abroad. Native Spanish language skills have also allowed me to chair Substantial Equivalency visits, and honed a keen interest in understanding how to best position architectural education and practice –not only within our own diverse institutions, but also across international boundaries.

My experiences as educator, academic colleague, researcher, designer, and active member of our profession, have led me to understand the value of collaborative leadership. They've revealed the transformative role that university programs in architecture can play in enhancing their communities, in advancing their academic disciplines, and in forging entrepreneurial cross-disciplinary connections that draw upon the best of myriad areas of expertise and technologies to shape a broadly accessible and resilient public realm. I believe that those engagements prepare me to lead an organization whose core mission is to convene and support diverse and visionary faculty voices as their work pushes the boundaries of our discipline and profession; to facilitate the development of diverse professional programs; to share insights and disseminate exemplary work using all the tools at our disposal; and to nurture skills in collaboration and in leadership. Over the past five years, the membership of ACSA has entrusted its leadership to dedicated, gifted colleagues: Norman Millar, Donna Robertson, Judith Kinnard, and incoming president-elect Hsinming Fung. I would welcome an opportunity to continue a clear trajectory of excellence, working with the ACSA membership to articulate and advance a shared vision for its future.
