OVERVIEW Architecture, as a discipline that is "thought" and "practiced", engages a great variety of people, ideas, intentions, expectations, methods, processes, cultures and worlds. Now more than ever, it seems, the architect's leadership is needed to meaningfully deal with such a constellation of challenges and opportunities. By interacting globally in significant ways, architecture opens new possibilities for learning from/with/in the world. Engagement also invites cultural communities' agency in conceiving architecture that will be effective and resonate internationally. The 2018 Administrators Conference will thus take advantage of its location in Quebec City to present and discuss topics that support or encourage architecture schools' internationalization and international engagement. Themes like enhanced study abroad, international enrollment and dual degree programs, student and faculty exchanges, will be addressed – as well as research partnerships and funding opportunities. The strategies and possibilities uncovered will influence and enhance the programming provided for schools by the ACSA in the future.

Les stratégies et les possibilités alors identifiées influenceront et amélioreront la programmation offerte aux écoles par l'ACSA dans l'avenir.

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

OPENING KEYNOTE: ANUPAMA KUNDOO

Anupama Kundoo's internationally recognized and award-winning architecture practice demonstrates a strong focus on material research and experimentation towards an architecture that has low environmental impact and is appropriate to the socioeconomic context. Founded in 1990, Kundoo has built extensively in India and has had the experience of working, researching and teaching in a variety of cultural contexts across the world: TU Berlin, AA School of Architecture London, Parsons New School of Design New York, University of Queensland Brisbane, IUAV Venice and ETSAB Barcelona. Kundoo is currently Professor at UCJC Madrid, where she is the Chair of 'Affordable Habitat'. She is also the Strauch Visiting Critic at Cornell University.

Kundoo's work extends to urban design and planning projects in addition to her background in rapid urbanization related development issues, about which she has written extensively. She taught urban management at TU Berlin and proposed her strategies for a future city for Africa as part of the Milan Triennale 2014. She is the author of 'Roger Anger: Research on Beauty/Recherche sur la Beauté, Architecture 1958-2008,' published in Berlin by Jovis Verlag in 2009. Her latest publication is a chapter entitled 'Rethinking Affordability in Economic and Environmental Terms' in the Routledge book 'Inclusive Urbanization: Rethinking Policy, Practice and Research in the Age of Climate Change' in 2015.

Anupama Kundoo was born in Pune, India. She graduated from Sir JJ College of Architecture, University of Mumbai in 1989, and received her PhD from TU Berlin in 2008. In 2013, Kundoo received an honorable mention in the ArcVision International Prize for Women in Architecture for 'her dedication when approaching the problem of affordability of construction and sustainability in all aspects'.

2018 ACSA Distinguished Service Award: Blanche Lemco Van Ginkel

Blanche was a pioneering woman in fields dominated by men, architecture and planning. She was the first woman to lead a faculty of architecture in Canada (and in North America), as dean at the U. of Toronto from 1977 to 1982. She was the first woman to be elected an officer and a fellow of the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada (RAIC). She was also the first woman elected president of ACSA (1986-1987).

As an architect, planner, and educator, Blanche has had a distinguished career as an award-winning practitioner and teacher who taught architecture and urban design in several schools in the US and Canada. Born in 1923 in Britain, she grew up in Montreal, where she graduated with an architecture degree from McGill U. Upon obtaining a degree in planning from Harvard, she taught for several years at the U. of Penn. and at Harvard before moving back to Montreal. She developed the first courses in urban design at U. de Montréal and then at McGill, before accepting a leadership position at the U. of Toronto in 1977, a city where she lives today. In recognition of her outstanding contributions, McGill U. presented her with the honorary Doctor of Science in 2014. There is a prize for urbanism in Guébec given in her name.



KEYNOTE: ANNA HERINGER

Anna Heringer, grew up in Laufen, a small town at the Austrian-Bavarian border close to Salzburg. At the age of 19 she lived in Bangladesh for almost a year, where she had the chance to learn from the NGO Dipshikha about sustainable development work. The main lesson was that the most successful development strategy is to trust in existing, readily available resources and to make the best out of it instead of depending on external systems. Eight years later, in 2005, she worked to transfer this philosophy into the field of architecture. Together with Eike Roswag and a team of Bangladeshi and German craftsmen she designed the Meti School in Rudrapur, Bangladesh, using traditional materials and building methods.. Heringer's other projects include the nearby DESI (Dipshikha Electrical Skill Improvement), a vocational training school for electricians, completed in 2008, and the Training Centre for Sustainability in Marrakech, Morocco, built in 2010. Since 2004, Heringer has lectured widely, both in universities and at conferences, and has undertaken consultancy work.

QUÉBEC HISTORICAL ARCHITECTURE WALKING TOUR

David Mendel, Mendel Tours \$55 USD

Experience Old Quebec with a local, beginning at the Dufferin Terrace, a vast boardwalk overlooking the St. Lawrence River, formerly the site of the Governor's Residence. Learn about the famous Chateau Frontenac hotel, its history and architecture, before seeing the Governor's Park and the monument to generals Wolfe and Montcalm. In the Anglican Cathedral of the Holy Trinity (1800-1804) you will see superb Communion Silver given to the Cathedral by King George III. Our next stop will be the Seminary of Quebec, founded in 1663. Now occupied by the School of Architecture of Laval University, this institution is a remarkable collection of buildings erected around enclosed courtyards. We will end our tour of the Upper Town with a visit of the magnificent interior of Notre Dame de Québec Basilica, which became the first Catholic Cathedral North of Mexico in 1674. Finally, we will descend the Côte de la Montagne to visit Place Royale, where French explorer Samuel de Champlain constructed his first Habitation in 1608 and where the Government of Quebec has restored merchants' houses from the time of New France.

Discover the living history of some of Quebec's oldest institutions. In 1639, the Governor of New France and the inhabitants of the tiny wilderness settlement of Quebec gathered to greet a long-awaited ship from France. On board were nuns from two religious orders: the Augustinian Sisters had arrived to found Quebec's first hospital, while the Ursuline Nuns had come to establish the first girls' school of the colony. Over the years these institutions have expanded and evolved, but the Hôtel-Dieu and the Ursuline Convent have retained ancient buildings dating back to the 17th and 18th centuries. During our tour we will see a wealth of magnificent embroideries, paintings, sculpture, reliquaries, silver, and objects from daily life spanning three centuries.

Explore the Montmorency Falls, one of the most remarkable natural sites in Canada, the falls are over 33 meters higher than Niagara. In the late 18th century, Governor Haldimand built a county house beside the falls. Today, the waterfall and Manor are surrounded by a beautiful park which includes extensive walking paths, a cliff-side boardwalk and staircases leading to a dramatic foot bridge over the waterfall.On the island of Orleans we will visit the picturesque village of Ste-Pétronille, once the base camp of General Wolfe and his army. From our vantage point on the western tip of the island we will have an exceptional view of the city of Quebec and its harbour which was once filled with the sails of hundreds of English warships. We will follow an old rural road to cross the island and pass through the village of St. Pierre before going over the bridge to return to Quebec.
